The Monologic Voice: “A Judicial Self-Fashioning”

Definition:

A legitimating rhetorical process that centers the Justice and/or the Court.

“Reflection has convinced me that as a judge I have no loftier duty or responsibility than to uphold...spiritual freedom to its farthest reaches”

Justice Murphy, *West Virginia State Board of Education v. Barnette* (1943)

The Monologic Voice

Individualistic Tone:

“My views on this matter are unchanged from those I set forth in my separate opinions in Webster”

Justice Scalia, *Planned Parenthood v. Casey* (1992)



Collective Tone:


“Our task, of course, is to resolve the issue by constitutional measurement, free of emotion and of predilection”

Justice Blackmun, *Roe v. Wade* (1973)



Our quantitative approach considers:

1. Does the monologic voice **generalize** to all court opinions?
2. Does the monologic voice use **individualistic** and **collective** tones?
3. What are **trends** in the monologic voice and its tones?



DistilBERT's classification performance is highest for the monologic voice









Justices Burton, Murphy, Ginsburg, Sotomayor, Frankfurter, Whittaker







Changes in the Monologic Voice Over Terms




Cohen's *d* effect size:


Vinson \longleftrightarrow Warren: **-0.166**


Burger \longleftrightarrow Rehnquist: **0.172**


Warren \longleftrightarrow Burger: **0.259**

Rehnquist \longleftrightarrow Roberts **-0.336**











The Roberts





The collective tone remains constant






The Roberts Court uses the collective and individualistic tones equally

Concluding Thoughts:

The Roberts Court is the first Court to use the individualistic and collective tones equally.

Legitimizing rhetoric responds to the political climate of a time period.

The collective tone is more strategic and appropriate for the Roberts Court.
